#### Our Purpose

To learn how to apply historical thinking and civic reasoning skills to past and present events with empathy and respect for ourselves and others - while intentionally building a safe and scholarly community

## Supplies Needed

## Thematic Approach

Our class consists of thematic units. Why?

- 1. We naturally think about things by topic rather than purely chronologically thematic units will help us to make deeper connections between ideas, concepts, and events
- 2. Survey classes cannot cover every historical detail thematic units will allow us to focus on high priority topics
- 3. A common critique of survey history classes is that they do not make it to current events and do not always feel relevant to your lives thematic units will allow us to talk about contemporary events and issues multiple times throughout the school year.

#### **Class Expectations**

- Our classroom is a discussion-based community of empathy and respect first and foremost, you are expected to treat our class topics and each other with kindness and respect

# National History Day (NHD)

- NHD (www.nhd.org) is a program that encourages students to explore historical topics and create projects to share what they learned during the research and development process
- Our first semester-long project will be to create a project for NHD
- This year's theme is Debate and Diplomacy: Successes, Failures, and Consequences
- Everyone will be required to participate in the school-level event during Exam Week
- Students will have an opportunity to compete in the NYC-level competition (typically in February). If you win your category and/or are selected by the judges, you may be able to compete in the regional-, state-, and national-level competitions
- We will complete frequent assignments throughout the semester to support your completion of this project
